MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR & CEO

What a year 2025 was! Truly a year of celebrations and uncertainty all rolled together! In last year's calendar we celebrated the 60th year of the signing of the federal legislation in August of 1964 that created Community Actions across the nation. This year we have taken the time to celebrate the five NH CAPs 60th birthday. In this calendar you will see many celebrations and achievements that remind us of the value we hold in our state and local communities.

Throughout the calendar you will find celebrations, achievements, official visits, generous gifts, and appreciative words, far too many to list in this letter! While we didn't capture a photo, in August the US Senate's Appropriations Sub-Committee on Agriculture staff (both sides of the aisle) visited our WIC and Commodity Food programs. It was an informative visit, and we were pleased they had the opportunity to see our programs in "action"!

As we write this letter for our annual report of 2025, we are in the midst of a government shutdown unlike any other we have faced over the years. We are concentrating on continuing our work of helping people to the best of our ability and working closely with the state to minimize the impact on those in need.

On a more upbeat note, we have been finalizing the renovations at our 40 Pine Street location with adult training and classroom space, a new reception area, and an elevator, along with facade improvements and a new improved parking area.

Our second Parent Leadership Training Institute (PLTI) graduation was held in July with keynote speaker Elaine Zimmerman, formerly with ACF and the founder of The National Parent Leadership Training Institute. Our partners at Manchester Community College and the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation helped make the night a huge success!

We were excited to open our newest Head Start classrooms; one in Milford at the Heron Pond Elementary School and one at Nashua Community College. Head Start classrooms in elementary and high schools and community colleges provide such valuable collaborations!

This year we were able to hand out years of service pins to our staff beginning at five years and up to 41 years! In addition, throughout the calendar you will see many of our staff recognized both locally and statewide for their dedication and commitment to serving those in need, our community, and their colleagues. We are so fortunate to have such dedicated staff who exemplify the mission of Community Action.

Speaking of years of service, both Donnalee and I would like to share our plans to retire from CAPHR in January of 2026. I have been associated with Community Action for the last forty years. I am amazed at the outstanding work being done to benefit the needy. As my tenure as chair is coming to an end, I thank the entire staff for their commitment to excellent service and to my fellow board members for giving their time to this most worthwhile endeavor. We are facing challenging times. It will take maximum effort from all involved to continue the good work. I know that everyone will do their very best. Thank you for allowing me to serve on the board for twenty-four years and to serve as your board chair for the last 5 years

As for me, (Donnalee), it was not an easy decision, but it is the right one at the right time. I will be forever grateful for the impact that this agency has had on my life and those we help, and for our community as a whole. I can say I have known Community Action for all of its 60 years! CAPHR CELEBRATES 60 YEARS OF COMMUNITY ACTION



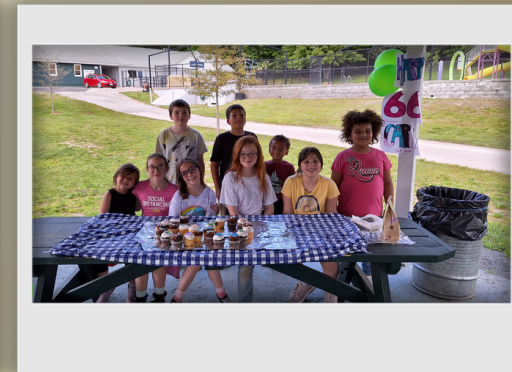
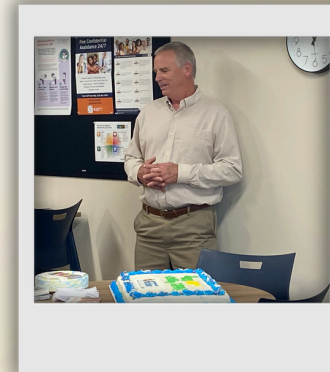
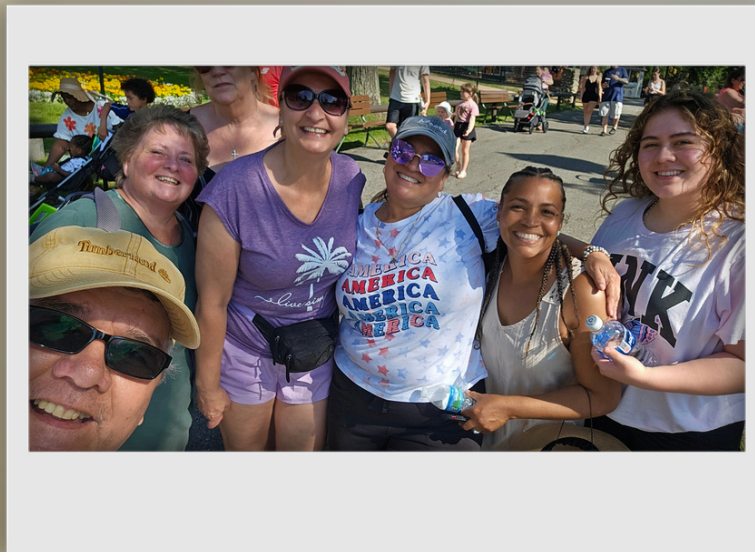
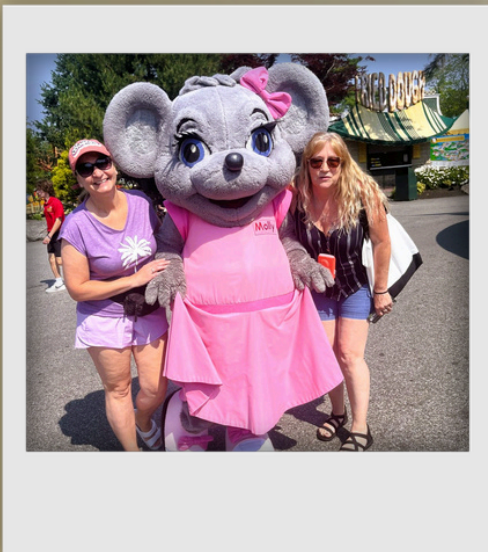

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

NH WORKS CONFERENCE

On October 17, 2025, the annual NH Works Conference, with the theme "Workforce in the 603: Growing Talent, Growing Together", took place where Office of Workforce Opportunity staff and volunteers from the NH Works partnership assisted in the successful execution of a day-long conference designed to provide education and training to frontline workforce staff. Educational sessions were led by volunteers who donated their time and expertise at no cost. CAPHR workforce development staff attended, volunteered, and presented. Hallsville Court Renamed to O'Shea Flats

Michael O'Shea began his agency tenure in 1973 working in programs such as surplus food, the food co-op, fuel and "rent-a-kid", which helped high schoolers with job placement. By 1976, he rose to the rank of the agency's Fiscal Officer, and in 1995 he took on the additional role of Deputy Director.

One of Michael's passions was Senior Housing. He leveraged the necessary resources to start our senior housing program in 1980 with the renovation of Greenville Falls, resulting in 70 units. Prior to his retirement in 2016, over 900 units housing over 1000 seniors had been developed.

To honor his contributions, we were pleased to rename Hallsville Court in Manchester to O'Shea Flats. This name pays tribute to his dedication to Community Action and senior housing as well as his faith, as this location was the former site of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church. On June 17 we proudly welcomed Michael's family, friends, and former colleagues to celebrate and honor him on what would have been his 73rd birthday. The event featured a renaming ceremony and the unveiling of a new sign in his honor and memory.

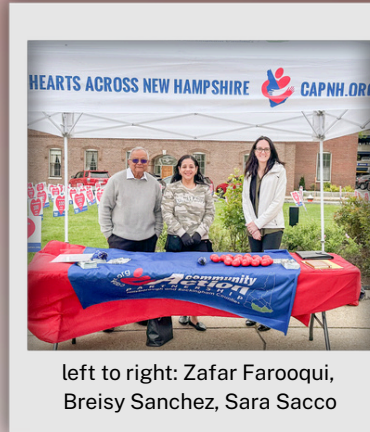

HEARTS ACROSS NEW HAMPSHIRE

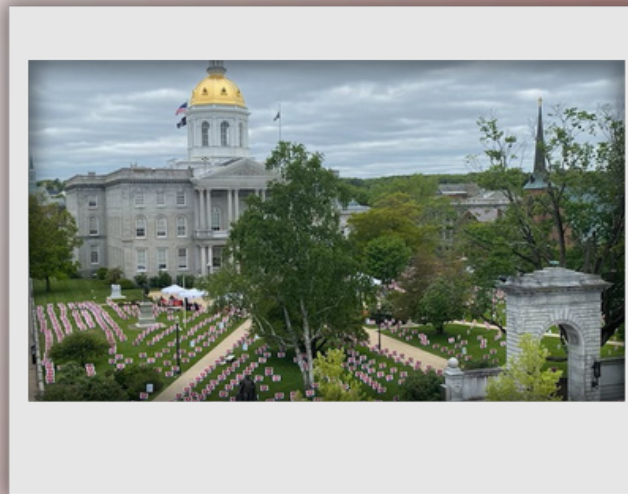
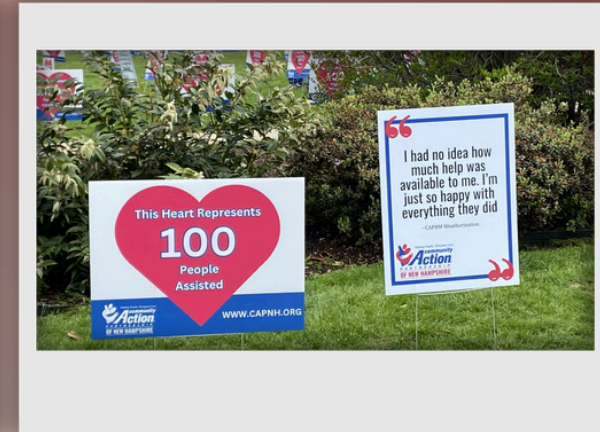
On May 21, 2025, New Hampshire's five Community Action Agencies convened on the State House lawn in Concord to commemorate sixty years of dedicated service to Granite State residents through the Hearts Across New Hampshire event. Jeanne Robillard of Tri County Community Action organized this impactful visual awareness initiative.

This gathering celebrated the 60th anniversary of Community Action in the United States, a movement that originated from President Lyndon B. Johnson's War on Poverty and the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. Since then, New Hampshire's Community Action Agencies have reached every corner of the state, focusing on empowering families, enhancing communities, and fostering long-term economic stability and well-being.

At the center of the display were 1,200 signs stretching across the State House lawn. Each sign represented 100 individuals assisted by Community Action Agencies during fiscal year 2024, collectively symbolizing 111,638 people served statewide, equivalent to 1 in every 13 New Hampshire residents. These figures underscore the reach and responsiveness of a network that continually adapts to local needs while staying true to its mission of helping people and changing lives.

WHAT IS COMMUNITY ACTION?

In 1964 the Economic Opportunity Act was signed by President Johnson the act read in part:

"The United States can achieve its full economic and social potential as a nation only if every individual has the opportunity to contribute to the full extent of his capabilities and to participate in the workings of our society. It is, therefore, the policy of the United States to eliminate the paradox of poverty in the midst of plenty in this Nation by opening to everyone the opportunity for education and training the opportunity to work, and the Opportunity to live in decency and dignity. It is the purpose of this Act to Strengthen, Supplement and Coordinate efforts in furtherance of that policy."

The **Community Services Block Grant (CSBG)** was passed in 1981, replacing the Economic Opportunity Act. In 1998, CSBG was re-authorized.

FUEL & ELECTRIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

FUEL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (FAP)

The Fuel Assistance Program provides grant benefits to reduce the costs associated with home energy bills and energy crises. New Hampshire continues to provide financial assistance for heating and utility expenses to low-income residents, including the elderly and disabled, through funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) also offers case management to help develop plans for financial self-sufficiency and prevent energy-related emergencies.

ELECTRIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (EAP)

The Electric Assistance Program aids income-eligible customers with their electric bills by providing discounts based on gross household income and size. Funded by the System Benefits Charge on electric bills, EAP helps customers afford their bills and prevent service shutoffs due to non-payment. Eligibility requires a qualifying income at the time of application.

Our FAP and EAP programs consistently provide support to individuals in our communities. The dedication of our agency staff leaves a lasting impact on our clients, guiding them toward a positive path for their families.

WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WAP)

MOBILE HOME TRAINING TO BETTER SERVE OUR COMMUNITIES



Hillsborough and Rockingham Counties have many mobile home communities, but CAPHR Weatherization faces challenges due to a shortage of skilled mobile home experts, with only one dedicated subcontractor compared to eight for site-built homes. This imbalance has delayed mobile home projects over the past year.

In Spring 2025, CAPHR attended the National Home Performance Conference in New Orleans, where Dan Girard was impressed by Drew Corbett and Kevin Scott's session on mobile home Weatherization. They invited Drew and Kevin to New Hampshire to train CAPHR Sub-Contractors. Over two days, they taught effective weatherization techniques to teams from R-Value to Quality Insulation, boosting the confidence of CAPHR Weatherization personnel. While ongoing training is needed, CAPHR is nearing its goal of having reliable mobile home Installers.

Weatherization Day took place on Friday, October 3, 2025, at Lakes Region Community College. During this special event, Dan Girard received an award from the New Hampshire Department of Energy in recognition of his outstanding career within the NH Weatherization Assistance Program. His unwavering commitment to excellence and his refusal to cut corners have consistently elevated the standards for those around him.

For over 40 years, Dan's approach has ensured that every client benefits from the highest quality energy audit and inspection. Whether he is training, auditing, or performing repairs, his professionalism and expertise ensure that each project, client, and team member receives the utmost care.

Ryan Clouthier (pictured on the right) delivered a heartfelt speech in honor of Dan, stating: *"Dan's career in Weatherization is marked by a profound impact on both individuals and the industry as a whole. Over the years, Dan has transformed the lives of thousands of program participants, trained hundreds of contractors and staff, and contributed to the evolution of Weatherization at the national level through his involvement in federal policy committees and presentations at major conferences."*

MANCHESTER OPPORTUNITY CENTER

The agency launched our first Opportunity Center in October 2024, located at 130 Silver St. in Manchester. This center offers essential services, including the Women, Infants, and Children Program (WIC) and the Fuel & Electric Assistance Programs. These services are provided in all of our resource centers. What makes this an Opportunity Center is the welcome desk, and the ability for the people we help to help themselves during our open hours (without an appointment), and have access to computers, printing, scanning, faxing and a little space to keep young children entertained! This new center enhances our existing Manchester campus, which includes the Child Development Center at 160 Silver St. and the Administrative Building at 40 Pine St., where we house our food warehouse, the Weatherization Assistance Program, and Workforce Development Initiatives.

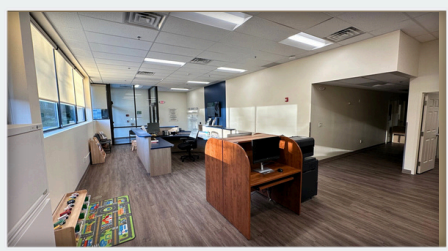
This project marks the start of our plan to maintain this momentum and revitalize more CAPHR Resource Centers into Opportunity Centers when space and funds are available.

DERRY OPPORTUNITY CENTER

In October of 2025, we refreshed the interior and exterior of our Derry Resource Center and rebranded it as an Opportunity Center. The center, located at 9 Crystal Ave. in Derry, serves Rockingham County. The Opportunity Center offers Child Development, Fuel & Electric Assistance, and WIC services. Now, like Manchester, Derry offers the ability for the people we help to help themselves during our open hours (without an appointment), and have access to computers, printing, scanning, faxing and a little space to keep young children entertained! Improvements include a welcome desk, intake rooms for client support, renovated classrooms and playgrounds for child development, and enhanced privacy for WIC clients. Staff also benefit from upgraded break rooms and new training spaces for the Workforce Development Program. These enhancements align with our mission to create a welcoming environment that meets community needs and provides essential resources for families. This would not have been possible without the advocacy of Executive Councilor Janet Stevens and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds approved by both the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery (GOFERR) and the Governor and Council.
